[What advice did you give him to maintain his English skills]

I always told H not to mix English and Japanese because I wanted him to grow up to be a person who could thrive in the world. Also, to foster an interest in the Japanese language, we spent quality family time engaging in activities like reading books aloud and playing traditional Japanese card games.

[Things that should have been done]

When considering H's future international endeavors, I believe it would have been beneficial for him to learn about traditional Japanese culture such as karate or tea ceremony.

[Things that shouldn't have been done]

While at Kinder Kids, I attempted to explain unfamiliar words to H using an English-English dictionary for children. Looking back, it might have been better to explain those words in Japanese.

[How did you decide which school to attend?]

Our foremost consideration in choosing a school was based on its educational philosophy. My three children have different strengths and interests, so after middle school, we let them go to the school of their choice based on their aspirations and individual strengths.

[Parenting advice from his mother]

To share our family's experience, we paid attention to what the children were saying and captured the moments when we felt they were "interested".

We actively looked for related books and materials and enjoyed exploring their interests together as a family. For instance, when he brought up a conversation about space from KinderKids, we'd pick up a science magazine like 'Newton' and expand the conversation by asking, 'Does it mean something like this?'

He was also passionate about manga, anime, and video games but I have tolerated this as part of the pursuit of the popular culture that Japan is famous for.

We have learned that parents' support was behind H's higher education and English skills. We sincerely hope that he will continue to explore and grow in the field of astrophysics.

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After being postponed for four years, It is finally back! Grad Club Australia Study Abroad Trip

After being postponed for 4 years due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are excited to be

able to resume the Grad Club's Australia study abroad trip. The study program took place in the Sunshine Coast region, north of the center of Brisbane in Queensland. Our students attended local schools and participated in activities with local students of the same age.







They took classes in various subjects at school, including a study on money management using a supermarket scenario. 

British Hills Study Tour

A large site that recreates a medieval British town, and once you step into the site, you are already in England. We spent two days immersed in English at this resort site, which has the most popular international study abroad program in Japan.









We went camping at an outdoor resort in the Joshin'etsu-kogen National Park, a habitat for many wild birds and wild animals such as a type of antelope, which is a protected national animal, to enhance "survival skills" through nature activities.

It was the Grad Club's first full-scale tent camp. The children were filled with anticipation and excitement for this first experience. Many of the students had never stayed in tents before, and for some, it was their first time attending a Grad Camp. Each activity carried out in the great nature is undoubtedly a valuable experience for their growth. They learned the importance of teamwork, challenging themselves and succeeding on their own in the great outdoors.









"Learning through Traveling," this time, aimed to acquaint students

with the nature of Shikoku and experience industries that take advantage of its natural resources and climate. Our daily lives and

industries in Japan are supported by abundant **water and forests**. Since our students usually live in urban areas, they don't have many opportunities to experience nature, and it is difficult for them to realize that their lives are supported by nature. We chose Tokushima and Kagawa in order to have students become familiar with nature through nature activities.

Before departing on our trip, students were divided into groups based on prefectures in Shikoku and studied about the region. Each group researched their assigned prefecture's distinct features,

historically significant places, and popular tourist spots, and compiled their findings on Jamboard.

The students also dearned about the town of Kamikatsu, Tokushima Prefecture, which aims to become a "zero-waste town"," providing a good opportunity to learn about the SDGs, which they have been studying in various subjects, and the initiatives that are actually being implemented in Japan.

Kamikatsu Zero Waste Center

[Zero Waste Town / Kamikatsu Town, Tokushima Prefecture]

Kamikatsu Town, located about an hour's drive from Tokushima City, is the least populated town in Shikoku with approximately 1,300 residents (as of September 2023). In 2003, they became the first in Japan to declare a 'Zero Waste' policy, aiming for a society where garbage is not disposed of and not generated. They implemented the sorting of waste into the most detailed categories in Japan, with a total of 13 types and 45 classifications. The town achieved a recycling rate of 80.6% in 2019.





On the first day, we experienced marine activities and a night walk at the YMCA Anan International Ocean Center in Anan City, Tokushima Prefecture. Many of the students had never been on a kayak before, and initially, some were hesitant. However, after taking that first step, they began enjoying themselves. During the night walk, we experimented with how colors appear differently in bright and dark places and observed the sea fireflies. As the location was rich in nature, the weather conditions changed frequently,

forcing us to change our schedule, but that was also one of the best parts of overnight

learning in the midst of nature.

These marine activities were meant to connect to larger challenges. For instance, those who experienced kayaking at a younger age will understand ocean currents and safety precautions when near or on the sea. Through firsthand experiences and understanding, older students would then try to reach an uninhabited island by boat. Growing mentally and physically through these experiences, and taking on larger challenges leads to confidence and nurtures a curiosity to know more about the world.

The next day, the students experienced making Sanuki udon noodles in Kotohira-cho, Kagawa Prefecture, followed by a visit to Kompira Shrine, which has been worshipped by many people since ancient times. After returning from the trip, we reflected on the trip using a reflection sheet. The students thought about what left an impression on them, what they learned, and what they would like to do on their next excursion. They also thought about how the city differed from their own city and expanded their learning.

The Future Vision of "Learning Through Traveling"

We would like to make "problem-solving" the main focus of "learning through traveling" so that children to get involved in solving social issues by actively engaging in them. Currently, predicting the future, even a year ahead, has become difficult, and for a better future we must understand "Now."

Understanding the current social issues and the direction the world should take becomes clearer by knowing "Now."

In Japan, there are high technical skills and culture

nurtured within its rich nature and historical heritage, and many industrial projects have been created that take advantage of these strengths. We are planning to conduct classes on interesting projects, such as "Agriculture with minimal water," "Wave power generation," "Sustainable seaweed business" and "Fusion power generation by the artificial sun." These would help solve social issues and we expect students to take leading roles in these projects.
